## KNOWLEDGE v. LOVE

#### 1 Corinthians 8:1-13

Knowledge is power. That is a true saying. I can be having trouble with my computer, then along comes someone who touches a button and everything works properly. It's a matter of knowing the right button to press. Without that knowledge I am powerless. Knowledge gives us power. It doesn't matter what kind of knowledge. Knowledge of the Bible or Christian theology gives a person power in argument or in understanding.

However, for the Christian there is a power more important than knowledge. It is the power of love. As Paul said, "Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up." The faith that we are called to is not one based on knowledge alone, but one that is fundamentally based on love – Christ-like, otherenhancing love. Yes, we need to know the message, the Gospel, but our faith needs to be something more than head-knowledge. Knowledge can make us feel superior, but love leads to humility and respect. Knowledge can be used to knock other people down while love builds up.

We will soon celebrate Australia Day with discussions as to whether it should be called Invasion Day. Whatever we think about this situation it cannot be resolved purely on the level of knowledge, whether it be knowledge about the tens of thousands of years that the indigenous people have lived here or knowledge about the first fleet and the stories of exploration and settlement that followed.

All of this knowledge needs to come under the guiding hand of love and that means respect for each other. It means listening to the hurts and cries of people who feel that they have been badly treated. It means listening to the voices of those who struggled against great odds. Knowledge, research, and learning can make us a powerful nation, but if that knowledge is not subject to the more important power of love we will become a menace to the peoples of the world, not a blessing.

If we are to be a great nation we need to build a society where acceptance and trust in one another predominate, where all people are valued irrespective of their level of income or of education. As followers of Jesus we are to be leaders in putting love into practice.

- What did Paul think love demanded in this situation? How might this apply to us today?
- What would Australian community life look like if love took precedence over knowledge?

#### Blood donors needed now

With record numbers of people unwell and having to isolate, 1 in 2 can't make their donation. Can you take their place? We're calling on an extra 5,500 people every week to give blood between now and the end of January.

## What is plasma?

Just over half of your blood is plasma. It's full of proteins that can be used in 18 different ways.

## How does a plasma donation work?

It's a lot like donating blood, and just as rewarding. The process is called 'apheresis'. It might sound complicated, but it's just another word for how we collect plasma (and platelets, too).

While you're resting in a comfortable chair, a special machine draws blood from your arm. The machine separates the blood out to collect the plasma, which is actually a yellow colour. It's yellow because your red cells, which make your blood red, are returned to you during the donation.

Donating this way means you give twice as much plasma as you would in a normal blood donation! And, on top of that, you can do it more often — as often as every two weeks.

# How much blood do you give when you donate?

**470ml.** It's about 8% of the average adult's blood volume. Within 24-48 hours of donating, your body will have fully restored your blood volume.

# How long does it take to donate?

**10 minutes.** But allow for an hour for the whole appointment, which includes meeting with a friendly staff member before your donation and having a complimentary snack and drink after.
