Love, That's the Essential

LECTIONARY THEMES

1 Corinthians 13:1-13

It doesn't matter how prominent you are in the church or the community, if you do not have love you are nothing. You could speak in tongues, be a famous preacher, doctor of divinity, be a shining example of faith, be outstandingly generous in supporting the church and charitable institutions with you finances, even suffer martyrdom for your faith, if you do not have love you are nothing. That's 1 Corinthians 13:1-3 for today. People may reach heights of holiness and distinction, but if they do not have love, they have missed the point.

That's what it is all about. Patient, kind and generous love. Love that is devoid of any kind of envy, pride or arrogance.

When we say that God is love, that's the sort of love that we are talking about. That's the love that brings creation into being. That's the love that was lived out in the life of Jesus. That's the love that accepts us as we are and works within us to help us become all that we can possibly be. That's the love that motivates us when the Holy Spirit moves in our lives. That's the love that Jesus was talking about when he summed up what God expects of us – love to God and love to others and a proper self-regard or love for ourselves.

Paul summed up this famous passage in his communication with the Corinthian church by saying that faith and hope are great gifts that God gives to Christians, but great as these gifts are, greater still is the capacity to love.

It's great to know that God loves us. We find there a great comfort in times of loss and trouble. But that same love is meant to be reflected in us toward others. That's what God is seeking to develop in each and every one of us – generous, committed, sacrificial, other-enhancing love.

The journey of faith is a movement further and further into a capacity for love of God and neighbour in all that we do, say and think.

- The word love is used in many different ways. What are some of them?
- To what extend does this make it difficult to talk about God's love and the love that God asks of us?
- Is it possible to act with love toward someone that you do not like? What is the difference between liking and loving?
- Where is love evident in the life of your congregation?

COVID-CARE AND SAFETY

As we are learning to live with COVID, some church activities are resuming whilst others are still in abeyance. There is no wrong decision. I recall our "C" at the beginning of COVID, two years ago: There were 9 at one stage and they still all apply:

Calm – be calm.

Cautious - be cautious.

Common sense – use your common sense.

Care – take care of yourselves and others.

Commit – commit the COVID-19 pandemic to prayer.

Candle – Light the COVID-19 prayer-candle at 7pm (19:00) in your window every night as a symbol of hope.

Connect – remember to connect with one another.

Communicate - talk to someone.

My personal buzz word at the moment is a 10th "C" – **Comfortable**. To attend or not to attend an activity – be it worship, a small group or committee meeting: Do what you feel comfortable with.

My Mask By Fr. Edward Schmidt S.J.

Holy God, you see me and you hear me.

Through my mask, you see if I smile or if I scowl.

Through my mask, you hear me if I whisper a brief prayer or mutter a muffled curse.

My friends don't see or hear or know; nor do my family; nor my colleagues.

But you do.

This mask takes away power – the power of clear communication but also the possibility to infect. But it also grants a freedom to be with.

My smiles, my thoughts, my mumbles, though – these I know, but they are a greater mystery to others now.

But not to you, Lord. You see past my mask, you hear through it, you know.

But your mask, Lord, what about your mask? Who can see through your mask? Hear through it?

I cannot.

I cannot see if you smile or if you scowl.

I cannot hear if you whisper an answer to my prayer or brush off my curse.

I cannot sense if you are pleased with me or if you are waiting for me to do much better.

Can we all take off our masks, Lord? Put them away?

When the disease that moves us to mask our faces for safety fades away, will our eyes and our ears be stronger, better able to see and to hear the smiles and the frowns, the cries and the whispers of those who fill our lives? Who make our lives worth living?

Will we see, Lord, that what we think of as your mask is really also our own, our inability to find you in the rush of our lives, our failure to see you in all the wonders you show us, our incapacity to hear your gentle voice in the tumult that surrounds us.

Can we know, Lord, that we put on many masks so we can cope, avoid, pretend, be acceptable? (What scar did the Phantom's mask hide? "Who was that masked man?")

Help us, Lord, to move beyond our masks. You are here for us to see and to hear. Help us. Let us take off our masks.
